NINTH ANNUAL BELL HELICOPTER ARMED FORCES BOWL DATE - For the second-straight year, the Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl is set for 11 a.m. (CST) on Friday, December 30 at Gerald J. Ford Stadium in Dallas. The first four Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl games were pre-Christmas affairs with an early evening kickoff with each being played on December 23. The next four games featured post-Christmas kickoffs with late morning kickoffs with the first three being played on December 31. After playing the first seven Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl games at Amon G. Carter Stadium in Fort Worth, the 2010 game was played December 30 at SMU’s Gerald J. Ford Stadium due to the renovations at TCU complex.

2011 BELL HELICOPTER ARMED FORCES BOWL OPPONENTS - The Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl continued to develop its national presence as the 2011 postseason collegiate football game will have Brigham Young University as a possible opponent for a Conference USA school if the Cougars are bowl eligible after completing the 2011 season playing an independent schedule. A Conference USA school has competed in seven of the past eight Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowls with the 2007 game featuring a contest between the Mountain West Conference (Air Force) and the then Pacific-10 Conference (California).

BYU - The Cougars are now 6-3 after losing 38-28 to TCU at Arlington October 28. BYU is one of 32 teams eligible for the post season as the Cougars became bowl-eligible when the Provo-based school posted their fifth-straight win with a 56-3 win over Idaho State at home one October 22. The Cougars opened the season by winning at Ole Miss 14-13 before losing 17-16 at Texas and 54-10 at home to Utah. BYU bounced back from the Utah setback with five-straight wins starting with home victories over UCF 24-17, Utah State 27-24 and San Jose State 29-16 before winning 38-28 at Oregon State. With the win over UCF, BYU now has a 43-12-1 all-time record against current Conference USA schools.

CONFERENCE USA - A C-USA school played in the first four **Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl** games before missing the 2007 game when Cal from the Pacific-10 Conference filled the spot against the Mountain West Conference (Air Force). While 2006, 2008 and 2009 **Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl** games featured C-USA schools and institutions from the Mountain West Conference, the 2010 post-season contest pitted independent Army against SMU of Conference USA with the Black Knights posting a 16-14 win over the Mustangs before a Gerald J. Ford Stadium record crowd of 36,742.

BELL HELICOPTER ARMED FORCES BOWL TICKETS - Tickets for the 2011 **Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl** went on sale September 1. From September 1 through November 14, the cost of public stadium seating will be \$50 per seat for the 2011 bowl game. From November 15 through the December 30 kickoff, the cost per seat will be \$60. The bowl is also selling a limited number of premium club seats for \$150 per ticket located in Ford Stadium's indoor club section on the west side of the stadium. Group ticket packages are available online at www.ArmedForcesBowl.com. Detailed ticket information for the 2011 **Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl** can be obtained through the bowl's web site or by calling the bowl office at 817/810-0012. As part of the bowl's tribute to the armed force, military veterans receive discounted tickets at \$30 per ticket and active-duty military personnel receive free admittance via the Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl corporate military ticket underwriting program.

GERALD J. FORD STADIUM - Due to the continued renovations at Amon G. Carter Stadium, the 2011 **Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl** will be played at the 32,000-seat Gerald J. Ford Stadium on the campus of Southern Methodist University in Dallas. After playing the first seven **Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl** games in Fort Worth, it was announced at the end of July 2010 to move the game to Dallas due to the planned Amon G. Carter Stadium renovations on the campus of Texas Christian University. The bowl management and SMU announced April 19, 2011 that the **Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl** would remain in Dallas for a second year. TCU's \$143-million renovation of the west side and north end zone of Amon G. Carter Stadium began immediately following TCU's final 2010 home game and is slated for completion prior to the Horned Frogs' 2012 regular season. Completely funded by donor support, the renovated Amon G. Carter Stadium will have a seating capacity of 43,000 that can be expanded to more than 50,000.

BELL HELICOPTER - A Textron Inc. Company, Bell Helicopter agreed August 23, 2006 to title sponsor the post-season college football game formerly known as both the PlainsCapital Fort Worth Bowl (2003 and 2004) and the Fort Worth Bowl (2005), which is now the Armed Forces Bowl. With those changes, the official name is the **Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl**. Bell Helicopter announced the renewal of its option to sponsor the 2008 and 2009 games at a 2007 Team Announcement Party (December 7, 2007). On September 9, 2009, President and CEO John Garrison announced a new agreement for **Bell Helicopter** to continue as the **Armed Forces Bowl** title sponsor through the 2011 game with a set option for two additional years for the 2012 and 2013 contests.

Bell Helicopter-Textron is an American manufacturer of commercial and military helicopters and tiltrotor aircraft with its headquarters in Fort Worth. Bell Helicopter provides the United States Armed Forces with the world's best military helicopters, including the V-22 Osprey, the OH-58D Kiowa Warrior, the AH-1Z Viper and UH-1Y Venom helicopters. A sister company, Textron Systems, produces the new M1117 Armored Security Vehicle, which is designed for speed and for deflecting rocket-propelled grenades and land mines.

2010 BELL HELICOPTER ARMED FORCES BOWL - Army's wins and losses in recent seasons have many times been determined by the turnover margin. Before a Gerald J. Ford Stadium record crowd of 36,742, the Black Knights used three first half turnovers to provide the spark for a 16-14 triumph over SMU in the eighth annual Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl. The victory pushed Army's final record to 7-6, the first winning season in 14 years. SMU wound up with a 7-7 ledger. On SMU's third play of the game, quarterback Kyle Pardon fumbled and senior defensive end Josh McNary picked up the loose ball and ran 55 yards for a touchdown to give Army a lead it never relinquished. Linebacker Stephen Anderson, Army's Most Outstanding Player with his game-high 14 tackles, and sophomore defensive back Josh Jackson had first half interceptions to stall SMU drives. Army entered the game tied for seventh nationally in turnover margin at +1.08 a game. Since the start of the 2006 season, the Black Knights are 14-4 when winning the turnover battle. Despite holding the edge in the turnover battle and benefitting from two missed SMU field goals, Army need two big offensive plays to secure the win. After SMU's Matt Szymanski missed a 47-yard field goal with 4:05 remaining in the game with Army nursing a 16-14 lead, the Black Knights offense ran out the clock thanks to two big third down plays. On third-and-five from their own 35-yard line with 3:20 showing on the clock, quarterback Trent Steelman ran for six yards and a first down. Then facing a third-and-four from the Army 47-yard line with 1:18 remaining, Steelman connected with Davyd Brooks with a 22-yard pass to seal the victory.

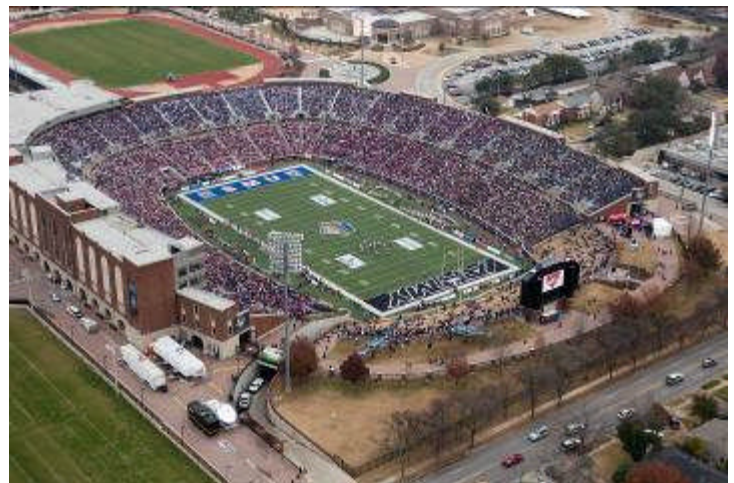

GERALD J. FORD STADIUM

In the history of the SMU football program, June 13, 1997 and September 2, 2000, may stand out as the most significant days since the program's inception in 1915. The first date is when University officials announced that significant funds had been raised to begin construction on the brand new Gerald J. Ford Stadium. The second is the date that Mustang football returned to campus with the inaugural game in the stadium against Kansas. The state-of-the-art facility would not have been possible without the generous donations of Gerald J. Ford, Lamar and Norma Hunt, Ray L. and Nancy Ann Hunt, and Sherrill and Jo Ann Pettus, all of whom are SMU alumni. Gerald J. Ford Stadium, finished in August of 2000 on the former Ownby Stadium grounds, has a horseshoe configuration with an open south end zone adjacent to Mockingbird Lane. The architecture is consistent with the Collegiate-Georgian style of the entire SMU campus and features traditional, yet state-of-the-art design concepts. The stadium has a seating capacity of 32,000 with the possibility for future expansion to 45,000. The 32,000-seat configuration includes nearly 600 preferred club level seats and 240 seats in 24 spacious luxury suites housed in a custom, three-level press box. In addition to housing preferred club and suite seating, the air-conditioned press box provides excellent sightlines and comfortably accommodates more than 125 working print, radio and television media. The playing surface is 25 feet below ground level, with half of the stadium's seats sunk below grade, ensuring a smooth transition into the surrounding neighborhood and the remainder of the SMU campus. Ford Stadium was designed by the sports and entertainment design division of Ellerbe Becket, Inc., an architectural firm based in Kansas City, Mo.

NOT THE FIRST - The 2003 **Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl** was not the first post-season collegiate football game played in the city. The "Fort Worth Classic" was staged on New Year's Day 1921 when the promoters staged a game between TCU and the Centre College Praying Colonels, an upstart Kentucky team led by players from Fort Worth. Centre won the game 63-7. It would be another 16 years before Dallas would host the first Cotton Bowl. Fort Worth also hosted a 1940s small-college bowl game, the Cattle Bowl, on New Year's Day at LaGrave Field.

NAVY 2013 & 2016, ARMY 2014 & 2017 - It was in September that the United States Naval Academy has extended its agreement to also compete in the 2016 **Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl** after signing an initial contract to play in the 2013 game. The United States Military Academy also signed an agreement in September to play in the 2014 and 2017 **Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl** games.

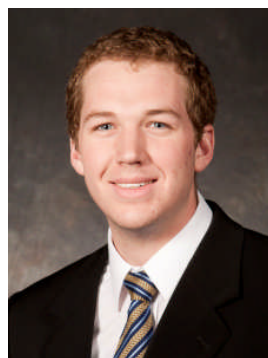

BYU FOOTBALL NOTES

BYU & TEXAS - BYU has now posted a 22-14-1 record for games played in Texas, including a 6-5 for contests played in the Metroplex (North Texas, 1-1, SMU, 1-0, TCU, 2-4, Oklahoma 1-0 and Kansas State 1-0). The Cougars dropped a 38-28 decision to TCU on October 28 in Arlington at Cowboy Stadium. BYU defeated Oklahoma 14-13 at Cowboy Stadium in the 2009 season opener. The inaugural college football game at Cowboy Stadium attracted a crowd of 75,437. BYU played three games in the state of Texas in 1997 by winning in overtime at SMU (19-16) and losing at Rice (14-27) and UTEP (3-14). Against Texas-based schools, BYU has a 46-20-1 record (two bowl wins). In 1942, BYU hosted Fort Hood and defeated the Army base team 28-14.

BYU TEXANS - The Cougars have five Texans on their 2011 roster, including redshirt freshman wide receiver **Ross Apo** (Arlington Oakridge School), senior wide receiver **McKay Jacobson** (Southlake Carroll), junior linebacker **Brandon Ogletree** (McKinney), redshirt sophomore lineman **Manaaki Vaitai** (Euless Trinity) and redshirt freshman lineman **Michael Yeck** (Keller). **Apo** (23 catches for 304 yards and four touchdowns) and **Jacobson** (19, 229, 1) are second and third, respectively, in pass receptions for the Cougars. **Ogletree** is BYU's top tackler with 53 total stops, including 28 unassisted tackles. He has 2.5 tackles for losses with one fumble recovery, one pass interception and two forces fumbles. **Yeck** is a backup at left offensive tackle.

MANY HAPPY RETURNS - Cody Hoffman became the sixth player in BYU history to gain 1,000 kickoff return yards after running for a career-high 167 yards on seven returns against TCU October 28. The sophomore now sits at 1,060 career yards, good for fifth all-time at BYU. His 680 return yards this season is currently fourth-best in a season. Hoffman's 52-yard kickoff return in the second quarter is the second-longest of his career and fourth return of 50 or more yards in his career.

HOFFMAN HYPE - Hoffman finished the TCU game with 234 all-purpose yards, his fifth game of over 100 and his third game over 200 all-purpose yards this season. Hoffman had 277 yards vs. Utah and 205 yards at Oregon State.

JD FOR A TD - Sophomore JD Falslev's 67-yard punt return against TCU for a touchdown late in the third quarter was the punt return for a TD by a BYU player since 2006 when McKay Jacobson turn a punt into six points vs. Wyoming.

NOT SINCE '96 - Falslev's return against TCU gives BYU a kick and punt return touchdown in the same season for the first time since 1996. Cody Hoffman's returned a kickoff 96 yards for a touchdown vs. UCF earlier this season.

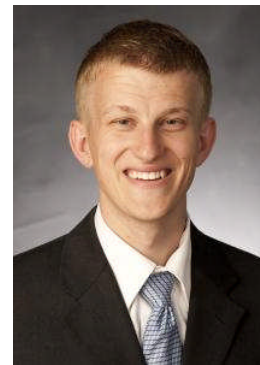
CAREER HIGHS - JD Falslev also set career-highs against TCU with 35 yards and five receptions, a team high. His 69 punt return yards is also a career-high mark.

SPREAD THE WEALTH - Riley Nelson's first seven completions against TCU went to seven different receivers, five of which went for 10 yards or more and included a 42-yarder to Ross Apo and a 22-yard throw to Michael Alisa.

GOOD ON THIRD - BYU converted 8 of 15 (.533) third-down conversions against TCU, its fourth-straight game of 50% conversion or better.

RUNNING PAST COACH - With 84 yards rushing against TCU, Riley Nelson moved into third place on the all-time rush list among BYU quarterbacks, passing current Cougar offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach Brandon Doman. Nelson now has 638 career rushing yards.

MENDENHALL MAGIC - During his six-plus seasons as the head coach at BYU, Bronco Mendenhall has returned the Cougars to the ranks of the nation's top teams. Taking over a BYU program in 2005 that was coming off three consecutive losing seasons, Mendenhall has guided his teams to seven-straight bowl invitations, two outright Mountain West Conference championships and regular national top-25 rankings. Under his leadership, BYU has earned 62-24 (.721) record to rank in the top 20 in wins among all teams in the nation during that span. The Cougars have received seven straight bowl invitations for the first time since a string of 17 consecutive bowls invitations from 1978 through 1994. Mendenhall is the only coach in BYU football history to take his first seven teams to a bowl game with a current 4-2 post-season record. Prior to coming to BYU, the 45-year old Mendenhall coached at Oregon State (1989-90 and 1995-1996), Snow College (1991-1992), Northern Arizona (1993-1994), Louisiana Tech (1997) and New Mexico (1998-2002). Raised in Alpine, Utah, Mendenhall graduated from American Fork High School in 1984. As a player, Mendenhall was a two-year starter at cornerback for Snow College (1984-1985) where he captained the Badgers to a perfect 11-0 record and the NJCAA National Championship. Mendenhall transferred to Oregon State and was a two-year starter, playing free safety, strong safety and linebacker for the Beavers. Mendenhall played He received a bachelor's degree in education from Oregon State in 1988 and a master's degree in education with an emphasis in exercise physiology also from OSU in 1990. His older brother, Mat, played football at BYU from 1975-1979, before spending four years in the NFL with the Washington Redskins. Another brother, Marty, was a former Mr. Utah bodybuilder. Mendenhall's father, Paul, was a defensive end at BYU from 1953-1954. Mendenhall, who resides in Alpine, Utah, is married to Holly Johnston of Missoula, Mont. They have three sons.

RATTO REPORT

In the **San Francisco Chronicle** in December of 2007, Ray Ratto profiled schools that received bowl "invitations despite losing six games" during the regular-season. Through January 9, 2011, a total of 51 schools have entered a bowl game with a 6-6 record with 27 of those schools winning their bowl game. Four of the 6-6 teams (Oklahoma State in 2006, Alabama 2007, Iowa State 2009, and BYU 2010) defeated another 6-6 team (Alabama 2006, Colorado 2007, Minnesota 2009 and UTEP 2010). This season, 14 teams had 6-6 records with one bowl game (New Mexico) featuring 6-6 schools (BYU and UTEP).
